Quarterly review

U.S. and international equities diverged as investors weighed the implications of a brewing trade war, waning consumer confidence and high valuations in the technology sector. After two years in a row of 20%-plus gains, U.S. stocks, as measured by the S&P 500, declined on the quarter, while European stocks rallied as investors rotated into value-oriented areas of the market. Bonds generally posted solid returns. U.S. Treasuries rallied as interest rates moved lower. The U.S. Federal Reserve took no action at its March meeting, leaving policy rates unchanged. Corporate bonds rose despite signs of weakening U.S. economic growth. Outside the U.S., European bonds rallied, driven by gains in the U.K., France and Germany.
