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Objective:

This fund seeks the balanced accomplishment of three objectives: long-term growth of capital, conservation of principal and current income.

Distinguishing characteristics:

This globally diversified balanced fund has the ability to invest generally between 45% and 75% of its assets in equities, with an emphasis on well-established companies, including those paying dividends and those with attractive growth prospects. The diversified and predominantly high-quality fixed income portion of the portfolio has the potential to provide income and limit volatility. Most of the fixed income exposure is hedged back to U.S. dollars.

Non-U.S. holdings:


The fund normally invests a significant portion of its assets outside the United States, including in emerging market countries. Under normal market conditions, the fund will invest at least 40% of net assets outside of the U.S. (or at least the level of the MSCI ACWI Index's ex-U.S. exposure minus 5%, whichever is lower).

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Standard Deviation: Annualized standard deviation (based on monthly returns) is a common measure of absolute volatility that tells how returns over time have varied from the mean. A lower number signifies lower volatility. Bond Statistic Effective Duration in Years: Effective duration is a duration calculation for bonds that takes into account that expected cash flows will fluctuate as interest rates change. Distribution Rate 12-Month: The income per share paid by the fund over the past 12 months to an investor from dividends (including any special dividends). The distribution rate is expressed as a percentage of the current price. Global Balanced Historical Benchmark: The Global Balanced Historical Benchmark returns reflect the results of the 60%/40% MSCI All Country World index/Bloomberg Global Aggregate Index through 12/31/2024 and the 60%/40% MSCI All Country World Index/Bloomberg Global Aggregate (USD-Hedged) Index thereafter. The MSCI All Country World Index is a free float-adjusted market capitalization weighted index that is designed to measure eguity market results in the global developed and emerging markets, consisting of more than 40 developed and emerging market country indexes. Results reflect dividends gross of withholding taxes through December 31, 2000, and dividends net of withholding taxes thereafter. The Bloomberg Global Aggregate Index represents the global investment-grade fixed income markets. The Bloomberg Global Aggregate Index (USD-Hedged) represents the global investment-grade fixed income markets with returns hedged to USD. This assumes the blend is rebalanced monthly. This index is unmanaged, and results include reinvested dividends and/or distributions but do not reflect the effect of commissions, expenses or U.S. federal income taxes. Yield Annualized 30-Day SEC: The 30-day SEC yield reflects the rate at which the fund is earning income on its current portfolio of securities calculated according to the standardized SEC formula; when applicable, it reflects the maximum sales charge. If shown, a net yield reflects fee waivers and/or expense reimbursements in effect during the period. Without waivers and/or reimbursements, the yield would be reduced. Gross yield does not adjust for any fee waivers and/or expense reimbursements in effect. Bond Statistic Average Yield to Maturity: A bond's total return if held to maturity and no default occurs or options are exercised. Assumes coupons are paid on time and accounts for their present value. Assumes principal is returned at maturity. Morningstar Category: In an effort to classify funds by what they own, as well as by their prospectus objectives and styles, Morningstar developed Morningstar Categories. While the prospectus objective identifies a fund's investment goals based on the wording in the fund prospectus, the Morningstar Category identifies funds based on their actual investment styles as measured by their underlying portfolio holdings (portfolio and other statistics over the past three years). R-Squared: R-squared is a measure of the correlation between a particular return and that of a benchmark index. A measure of 100 indicates that all of the return can be explained by movements in the benchmark. Generally the higher the R-squared measure, the more reliable the beta measurement will be. Beta: Beta relatively measures sensitivity to market movements over a specified period of time. The beta of the market (represented by the benchmark index) is equal to 1; a beta higher than 1 implies that a return was more volatile than the market. A beta lower than 1 suggests that a return was less volatile than the market. Generally the higher the R-squared measure, the more reliable the beta measurement will be.
